About United Nations Peacekeeping



More than 102,000 UN peacekeepers are currently deployed across the globe in some of the most fraught regions. They stand between civilians and the forces of violence; between crisis and peace. Their bravery and commitment exemplify the UN's mission "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war".

The UN's 14 peacekeeping operations cost around \$6.7 billion a year, about a half a percent of global military spending. UN Peacekeeping has a proven track record of preventing conflict and atrocity crimes. Academic studies have shown that the presence of peacekeepers significantly reduces the risk of renewed warfare and the number of civilian deaths.

International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers

3,832 UN peacekeepers from 119 nations have lost their lives; of these, 106 were British. The International Day was first observed in 2003 on 29 May, the date in 1948 when the first mission began operations in Palestine, to pay tribute to all those who died in the line of duty.

Peacekeeping and the UK

Once the largest contributor of troops to UN peacekeeping missions, the UK currently contributes around 600 peacekeepers. The UK is the sixth largest financial contributor to peacekeeping.

About those we remember:

Count Folke Bernadotte

Count Folke Bernadotte, head of the Swedish Red Cross during World War II, led a relief expedition to Germany, saving 30,000 concentration camp prisoners. Serving as the UN's mediator in Palestine, he was assassinated in Jerusalem in 1948, becoming the first member of United Nations staff to be killed in the line of duty.

Commandant René de Labarrière

The French officer, Commandant de Labarrière, was the first United Nations peacekeeper to lose his life. Serving as a Military Observer in Palestine, he was killed by a landmine in 1948.

About the ceremony:

The Band

The Band of the Parachute Regiment is the official musical band for the Regiment and attends a variety of formal, commercial and commemorative events. Highly trained musicians, they are recruited from Bandsmen and women across the Army. After selection, entitled to wear the coveted Airborne Forces Maroon Beret in uniform.

The Contingent

As in previous years the ceremony will be led by the Colour Guard of the United Nations Veterans Association, retired United Nations peacekeepers who served in the Irish and British armed forces. This year they are joined by a contingent of recently returned UN peacekeepers from the British armed forces. This contingent is made up of members of the Defence Medical Services, who served for the UN in South Sudan, and members of the Scots Guards, who served for the UN in Cyprus.
